Councilmember Slayter announced the Senior Center Open House, Thursday, September 15th.

Mayor Gurney announced the community forum on the community survey for community impact reports, Thursday, September 15th.

Jim Wheaton, Jesse Street, commented as follows:

- Thanked the Council and staff for their work
- Discussed public safety (old Ford Building)
- Discussed a sidewalk is needed at this location
- Discussed construction of CVS and took sidewalk away in front of Brown Street
- No notification there of no sidewalk
- Jaywalked across street many times
- Have to walk to Morris Street and then come up Sebastopol Avenue
- A lot of people do not know that and come to the no crosswalk area
- Like Council to take this on
- Hate to see someone get hurt there
- Contact Caltrans to see if we can get a temporary sidewalk there
- Questioned when the new sidewalk is scheduled to be complete
- Would like something to be done
- Suggested putting white strips across the street
- Not a safe situation
- Need help to help make it safe

Steven Pearce, Jesse Street, commented as follows:

- Works in former Ford building
- Walks to work
- Jaywalking four times a day
- See it quite a bit from other people as well
- People climbing over the concrete barrier and making way in two inch gap
- Talk of dangerous condition
- Hope is that the City has learned something from this
- If have big projects that require closing off of sidewalk, require phasing of those projects to do infrastructure first of crosswalks and sidewalks
- Discussed safety factor
- City can call shots on permits for construction and require phasing

Timothy Lane, High Street, commented as follows:

- DJ
- Talk of the skate park
- Give gratitude for graciousness of City Council to allow skate park to be included and funds for the park next to skate park
- Huge boost to adult skate boarders
- Discussed potential for liaisons in Ukraine
- Forestville Skate Park Organization is starting up
- Welcomed people to attend
- Potential for another liaison or political statement regarding situation in the Dakotas right now
- Questioned if there is a local organization that works with local natives on sacred areas
- Matter of setting example

Jacob Rich, Medved Lane, commented as follows:

- Speak to housing crisis
- Born in Sebastopol
- Moved back
- Live with parents now
- Affecting character and demographic makeup of community
- Affecting economy
- Discussed facing continue to live here on meager salary or becoming homeless
- Discussed lack of action to face housing crisis
- Discussed Barlow with no housing required as originally part of plan
- Voiced concern with hotel
- Discussed no affordable housing projects in pipeline
- Discussed developing housing action plans
- Suggest support and move to being NIMBYs – hope for diverse communities

Mayor Gurney requested comments to public comments:

- Last council meeting she discussed correspondence received from constituents about rising rents
- Discussed if a council member wants to be a housing champion
- Commitment with next Council
- Appreciate comments of Skate Park
- Ribbon cutting ceremony for the Skate Park
- Looking at crossing of Highway 12 – important concerns of safety
- Has no answers to CVS
- Appreciates patience of community in dealing with that construction site
- More impact than thought it would have
- Received correspondence on that issue

Engineering Manager Mikus replied to public comments and stated he did not know the schedule of CVS.

Mayor Gurney questioned the completion time of CVS.

Engineering Manager Mikus commented as follows:

- Not comfortable stating their completing date
- A lot of work done with Caltrans and safety issues on Highway 12 and intersection with Highway 116
- Caltrans listened to the City
- City still has concerns though
- Process is better than it would have been otherwise
- Will speak to City Engineer
- Get latest schedule
- Talk to CVS construction of doing something positive

Police Chief Weaver commented as follows:

- Not personally aware of issue
- Except for two blocks in Sebastopol any one can cross street anywhere they want to as long as safe to do so
- Car not close enough to constitute hazard
- (Two blocks North Main Street – McKinley to Downtown; and Block from Main Intersection from Petaluma Avenue to Highway 12) cannot cross at these two locations
- Enhanced crosswalk preferable

Mayor Gurney commented as follows:

- Important to think of that safe crossing
- Need safe haven
- Practice extreme caution
- Think of going the long way around

- Hope a sidewalk closed ahead sign can be placed sooner to alert people that the southerly portion of that sidewalk is closed
- Suggested putting these signs up sooner than where they are now located
- Staff will provide information to the public
- Check City web site for announcements
- Discussed liaisons to Sebastopol World Friends (Councilmember Slayter)

 - Discussed selection process
 - Living people are more effective inspirations and role models in the community
 - Engage more and more authentic and more local role models
 - Discussed the nominations
 - Give thanks deserved
 - Means a lot to them to be on peace wall
 - Alicia Sanchez and Barry Connick were in attendance (received awards) and commented as follows:
 - Union organizer
 - Spoke to students
 - Never prepare anything until got there
 - Not know what to say to high school students – only worked with adults
 - Discussed no longer being afraid or ashamed
 - Discussed affecting another child who said she was not afraid any more
 - Impact on young kids while alive
 - Discussed unsung heroes
 - Not seeking awards
 - Seeking to try to have people continue the struggles and paths
 - Get inspired
 - Love community
 - Try to help person that has less than us
 - Want people who are living
 - Trying to be an example
 - Hope consider the names
 - Doing for future generations
 - Consider have living persons be there
 - Generations will follow and continue path of peace and justice
 - Richard Retechi read a prepared statement from Barry Connick as follows:
 - Discussed having name inscribed on peace wall
 - Work done no matter how small has made a difference
 - Important to remember and honor those how have worked for peace
 - Celebrate on going work
 - Place for all people to come together
- A daughter of the award recipient commented as follows:
- Discussed what this would have meant to her father if he had been alive at time honor bestowed George Houser (father)
 - Died a few months before
 - Found out at the memorial father was being honored

- Father died at age 99
- Always a peace activist
- Body was broken but mind still active
- Continued to continue the work that he was doing
- Every time honored, meant so much
- Still relevant
- Work acknowledged and appreciated
- Aware of synergy that exists in life – generosity and gratitude
- Doing what you believe in and what you feel is right
- Gratitude – enlivened him

- Evident this is a labor of love

Mayor Gurney commented as follows:

- Thanked the committee and support group
- Grateful all come tonight to tell story of how felt for awards
- Personal touch living person connecting to someone else in the community
- Connection makes this work
- Peace is expanded
- Means a lot that Timothy Lane came back and got in touch with the Council and make a remark
- In sphere of community building
- Visibly present
- Others here
- People come and be present while all in this world together
- What makes our life meaningful
- Grateful committee is going forward and keep planning to keep this peace wall alive with the next years of recipients

11. Public Hearing – Public Hearing on the Final Environmental Impact Report (FEIR) and Draft General Plan. The General Plan sets broad, long-term City policy in a number of areas, and may result in changes to land use and zoning designations, changes to the Zoning Ordinance, and revisions to other City codes. (Planning Director)

Planning Director Webster presented the staff report recommending the City Council conduct a public hearing, consider Planning Commission recommendations, and adopt resolutions Certifying the Final EIR and Adopting the General Plan.

The consultant provided a presentation to the City Council.

Mayor Gurney stated the Council received a copy of the letter from the property owner, Anita Robinson.

Mayor Gurney commented as follows:

- 4 different Council meeting dates for this
- Time reserved in calendar to make sure this final EIR is fully vetted by the public
- Plenty of opportunity to speak and be heard
- Council have time to digest the material and respond and make sure getting everything just right
- Significant and long lasting document
- Matter is coming on right after holiday weekend
- Councilmember have enough time to consider material
- Personally not as prepared as if it were on a different weekend
- Public in same circumstance
- Council and community have opportunity to discuss together
- Planning Commission made quick work of this
- Started land use chapter – most difficult meeting
- Most significant chapter and most impactful chapter in General Plan
- Next most impactful is circulation
- Traffic is significant issue in community
- Hear that regularly

- Would like to take easier chapters first
- Suggest to take those chapters in order 3 forward back to 2 and then back to 1
- Not finish tonight
- Need to hear from the public
- Do thorough job as fulfill public responsibilities
- Had request to make sure there is opportunity to speak and provide remarks
- If people cannot stay though this chapter by chapter review, general comments come in on three minute timer tonight
- Continued public hearing and provide opportunity for comments son that material
- Organizing by subject matter
- Organize well
- Comment, discussion, comment
- More opportunity for public comment
- Public Hearing continue through all chapters and continued to next Council meeting
- Public honored with opportunity
- No policy on speakers
- Allow speakers to organize themselves to capture comments Chapter by Chapter

Councilmember Slayer questioned which chapters on which night.

Mayor Gurney suggested working with the consultant to determine which chapters to discuss tonight.

The consultant commented as follows:

- Planning Commission dealt with EIR first and then Chapters
- Remaining Chapters finished in next meeting
- Those chapters not a lot of public comment
- No significant changes recommended
- Suggest focus on first five chapters tonight
- Community Services
- Conservation
- Noise
- Community design
- Safety

Councilmember Slayer questioned if the Council would be starting at Chapter 4.

Mayor Gurney questioned discussing the EIR first and the process.

The consultant commented as follows:

- EIR not have mitigation measure
- Can certify the EIR first
- Measures reside in General Plan
- Discussed significant and unavoidable impacts
- If comfortable with General Plan, can certify EIR
- Can talk of all General Plan and hold off till end

- Not recommend looking at both tandem

Mayor Gurney stated it makes more sense to talk of General Plan then EIR and stated it would be her recommendation to deal with up to 5 chapters, starting with community services and facilities then refer the next three subjects (circulation, land use and EIR to next meeting or meetings).

Councilmember Slayter proposal to look at FEIR at tale end makes more sense and would prefer to hold off on that and be as prepared as possible.

Vice Mayor Glass commented as follows:

- Think all makes sense
- Focused attention on FEIR
- Less prepared to come from other direction
- Makes sense though
- Proceed as recommended

Mayor Gurney stated the Council will have an opportunity to wrap this up at the end and if the Council misses something have a chance to pull it together than.

Councilmember Slayter questioned if the Council has questions on any topic, it can be revisited at any point and if in a month an issue comes up, something came to light, or the Council receives communications, etc., the Council can revisit it at that time.

Mayor Gurney commented as follows:

- In that wrap up discussion, the Council can go through the changers in order
- Conclude and then look back
- Challenging to get everything all together in one time line

Mayor Gurney opened the public hearing.

Nancy Prebelich, Leland Street, commented as follows:

- Passed photos to the City Council
- Did collage project of land use of 7600 Leland
- Not like what she saw
- Set on two years of process
- Started in 2014 of going to visioning workshops
- Attended GPAC meetings
- Discussed miscommunication of specific proposal
- Discussed confusion of planned use and zoning
- Provided over 200 signatures from community
- Recently have another 115 signatures in support
- Requested another letter be added
- Clear it is the land use designation for her end goal to get rezoned as residential agriculture
- Part of end goal
- Work with Council and community with regard to ordinances for res Ag zoning
- Proud of overwhelming support displayed
- Tired of asking them to continue to articulate the same support
- Hoping to get on this path
- In home stretch
- Proceed with intention of reaching end goal

Jane Preston Fiori, 7611 Bodega Avenue, commented as follows:

- Lived there for three years
- Has not seen a lot of public notice
- Personally had no clue this was happening
- Used to getting notices in the mail
- Wants to discuss notification issue
- Discussed the proposed change to density from moderate to maximum on a lot of the properties all along Bodega Avenue
- Quite of a swatch of properties on Bodega Avenue
- 24 apartments units per acre
- A lot of people to add to congested area on Bodega Avenue
- Cannot get out of driveway
- Why think of increasing the density
- Totally appropriate to have granny units for low incoming housing in this town
- How possibly accommodate that many more people along that strip
- Add traffic and impact on our community
- Mind blowing
- Not get anything in mail box of change of density for neighborhood
- Concern with that lack of notification
- Concern with adding to congestion of town
- Discussed right hand turn lane by new CVS – stated that has now disappeared
- Created so much more congestion

Jonathan Greenberg, 312 Pleasant Hill Avenue, commented as follows:

- Thanked people on General Plan committee
- Enormous task
- Stated the Plan does not address concerns of Issue of zero emissions vehicles for City fleet
- Resolution 5729 - Passed Feb 2009
- How we vote for our dollars with emissions
- Discussed PW vehicles
- 0 electric vehicles
- 40 years since many cities have used electric vehicles for routine tasks
- Disconcerting State of CA passed law calling for 30 percent of vehicles to be zero emission in 2030
- Language in plan states to explore feasibility of replacing the existing fleet
- Suggested Resolution language during preparation of the Plan that would add zero emissions vehicles by 2030
- Matching State of CA requirement
- See in General Plan and City Parks

Carol commented as follows

- Discussed 24 apartment units
- Discussed concern with traffic
- Absolutely unthinkable
- Traffic so bad
- Want to support Leland recommendation
- Area is inspiration for whole community
- Heart of neighborhood
- Everyone in neighborhood wants to support that agricultural component
- Thanked Council for their service

Bruce Loftche, 7826 Leland, commented as follows:

- Came from San Joaquin valley
- A lot of things changed things in his life
- Discussed mega ag
- Discussed being exposed to one or two animals on Leland Street
- Being exposed to natural things
- Have healthy food
- Support concept of being able to do something with that than rather eat it
- Leland approach allows us to get our money back
- Production for use and then sell to neighbors
- Astounded any difficulty in Nancy trying to make this happen on Leland

Michael Carnacchi, 385 Murphy Street, commented as follows:

- Stated he has been a part of the process from the beginning
- Discussed EIR report out by Caltrans
- Recommend for livability and vitality of Sebastopol
- Discussed by pass of Highway 116
- Alternative route for trucks and traffic
- Discussed page 35 under circulation, CIR 1B coordinate with County and Caltrans
- Discussed action item
- Conversation with Sebastopol and County and Caltrans
- Discussed Sebastopol Downtown Plan (1990)
- Any discussion of by pass in conjunction with redoing the downtown plan

ila Benavidez-Heaster, Bodega Avenue, commented as follows:

- Sat through every single meeting
- Read all of the General Plan
- Wondered why more people are not here
- What is the issue
- Kept looking at that
- Asked to receive information
- What is missing
- What is not working
- A lot of information goes out
- Where is the gap
- How do we shore it up
- How does that happen
- Fascinating to watch it
- Amount of work is incredible
- Where is the problem
- People coming in and say not hearing a thing
- Possibility to start looking at what does not work and why it does not work
- Stop listening to the same things
- Those who don't speak should speak
- Hope wonderful moment and open it up
- Not know where start or ends

Rusty commented as follows:

- Agree with that
- Feel there is a gap somewhere

- Just found out that the City approved 60 room hotel at the old diamond yard property
- Stated she was at those meetings

- Improve efficiency of the City's fleet but not as numerical assignment of zero
- Left that in the Climate Action Plan effort
- Could be cumbersome to include all of
- Not want to conflict or duplicate the Plan
- Includes efforts to encourage and implement the Climate Action Plan

Michael Carnacchi commented as follows:

- Discussed the concrete plant property
- Zoned light industrial
- Questioned if we cannot build on it
- Discussed if the idea of a satellite school is squashed

Mayor Gurney commented as follows:

- Situation complicated and made simpler by CAP 2020
- Regional Plan
- Has all subchapters city by city
- Understand cumulative effect of all of us in the county
- Makes sense to put that plan forward
- Discussed community separator initiatives
- Not know result of the election
- If passes would the City have issue with this plan being in conflict with that initiative item

The consultant commented as follows:

- GP includes actions and policies that encourages communities
- Stated there are no conflicts
- Langue not specific enough

Mayor Gurney questioned if this Plan supports that in the event the measure passes.

The consultant stated yes.

Councilmember Slayter commented as follows:

- Stated Seattle did something along these line
- Big lift for Seattle
- Not know carbon score
- Big idea

- Improbability but speaks to many values that we hold but can the City make its operations carbon neutral
- Discussed Goals COS 8 - Talks of reducing emissions for greenhouse gasses

The consultant commented as follows:

- Not seen so boldly stated to be carbon neutral
- Including it in the General Plan gives clear direction of what the City wants to do in terms of the carbon footprint
- Acceptable to include
- Does not commit the City to achieving it
- Add to goal COS 8
- Include as policy statement or goal language

Mayor Gurney questioned if Councilmember Slayter is indicating the City as a municipal entity.

Councilmember Slayter that is correct.

The consultant stated that a separate policy statement could be appropriate that the City is moving towards being carbon neutral.

Vice Mayor Glass commented as follows:

- Likes that policy
- Interested in how we very positively dovetail that policy into our CAP
- CAP does not say how carbon neutral does or how many tons of GHG
- Concern of having language that is very goal oriented about carbon neutral and GH reduction
- And putting in here that referring to a very aggressive CAP
- CAP is regional we have our specific part
- Want our part to be aggressive
- Stated she is in favor of this but wants it to be very aggressive

Mayor Gurney commented as follows:

- Supports this
- Great addition
- Consistent with everything we have done

Councilmember Jacob concurred.

Councilmember Slayter discussed editing and how the Council will circle back to these edits.

The consultant commented as follows;

- She is taking notes
- Will go through the revisions
- Go through revision
- Describe at final wrap up
- Will have revisions typed up

Mayor Gurney stated it would be helpful to have the notes as the Council moves forward.

Councilmember Slayter commented as follows:

- Cal Green tier 1 listed
- Seems stable standard now as part of the building code

- Hesitant to say what the language will be in the future

- Discussed energy and how to use sustainable energy to supplant an existing dirty technology

Mayor Gurney questioned if this was for signing everyone up for evergreen.

Councilmember Slayter commented as follows:

- Discussed Part of 9-6
- Efforts to increase the use of electric vehicles supported by additional charging stations and lower cost electric vehicles
- Call out specifically

Mayor Gurney stated this is supportable from history and culture.

Councilmember Slayter commented as follows:

- From January until now, this is a program that SCP has been working on and that has grown tremendously
- Becoming a developed plan to move forward with this
- Enormous economic opportunity for the County
- To shift fuel from dirty to clean to local is a game changer
- Needs to call out more specifically

Councilmember Slayter suggested language such as supporting equipment such as charging stations.

- Smart Meters have opportunity to save tremendous amount of energy
- To disallow residents the use of that technology, not sure he is comfortable with that language
- Think it would be important to allow people to time of use shifting
- Energy savings obtained with knowledge is tremendous
- Knowledge is through use of smart meter
- Community opt out
- Wrong direction
- Individual property owners should be allowed to make choices for their own property and energy use
- Allowing individual prop owners to install new energy saving technologies as they become available

Mayor Gurney questioned the City Manager as to what the status is of Smart Meters now in the City.

City Manager McLaughlin replied as follows:
